ADMINISTRATION REPORTS & COMMUNICATIONS

Mayor Cervenik – We have a number of announcements tonight and I'll start first with Director Will.

Director Will – Before I begin about the upcoming events, I wanted to highlight and thank everybody for all of their participation in this past weekend's Relay for Life. I guess I don't have to say anything because as we look over at Mayor Cervenik, we know that we came close to our goal. He had given us a challenge and over the past couple of months and up through Friday, actually Saturday morning at 11:00, we've raised almost \$50,000 which is \$10,000 more than we had done the previous year. Thank you to everyone. Thank you to Mayor Cervenik for going ahead and shaving your head because we did make such a great tremendous effort and we did raise it \$10,000.

For everybody who was there, thank you. I know there was people who walked and walked and walked. The weather held out for us, it was a great event. Thank you to the School Board for allowing us to utilize the High School field and City Council for all their support, the administration, everybody that came out. If you didn't have an opportunity, we will be doing this again next year. The event will be in May, I don't have the exact dates but it will be around the same weekend. The Relay for Life 2010, we are collecting donations through August 31st, that is when 2010 will end. We do still have that possibility to get to \$60,000 but at this point, he's already done it. Then September 1st this year, we will start collecting and doing fundraisers for the 2011. I do know I've had a couple of challenges that have already been brought up to me which will come out while we are campaigning for next year. One I heard that if we raised \$75,000 there was another individual on the administration that was willing to shave his head, I won't mention any names.

However, we've also had a challenge for anybody that was up at 5 AM had the opportunity to see Aqua-Man walk in his full scuba gear around the track, flippers, tank, everything on. It only took about 15 minutes, that shocked me, I thought it would take a lot longer. Because he did that, there was a challenge made to me and now I'm going to challenge some other folks for next year for giving us two laps and maybe also some turnout gear. Thank you Councilman O'Neill for doing that. Thank you again to all the Council for coming out and supporting it, but we couldn't have had a better weekend. Thank you again.

Remind everybody that Parks & Recreation registration is still going on. All of our programming is still opening except for registering for fast pitch. Our girls fast pitch has now started and their first game is this week. We do have openings in our girls slow pitch and soccer, tennis, swim team, etc. Pools will open on Monday, June 14th. If you want to come on in and get your pool passes, or still register for any of the programs, we have registration, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 10:00 AM until 4:00 PM. On Tuesday we do it from 10:00 AM until 7:00 PM. This Saturday, May 22 we will be open 10:00 AM until Noon. If you have any questions about the programming, please call 289-8114, or check out the website, www.cityofeuclid.com.

Remind you that the Farmer's Market is taking place at Shore Cultural Centre in the parking lot. It will be every Friday from now until the end of October from 2 PM until 7 PM.

On Saturday, June 5th will be the East 200th Street Stroll. Although the parade has been cancelled, the stroll will begin at 10 AM and if you're interested, call Sherrie at 798-7089; 10 AM until 3 PM, is the E. 200th Street Stroll.

The City of Euclid and members of the Memorial Park Master Plan and residents have been talking about a community garden. We have looked at different locations and one of the locations that we are wanting to do a community garden is outside of Memorial Park, north of the Jail, across from the old Strike Zone. We put together a committee and are trying to get more members. If you're interested in participating in a community garden, our next meeting in regards to garden design and determining what kind of garden we would like will be held on Thursday, May 27 at 7 PM in the Euclid Public Library in the Lake Room.

Just to remind everybody, Tuesday, May 25th, will be a Recreation Commission Meeting here in Council Chambers at 7 PM. Thank you very much.

Director Pietravoia – I would just like to remind Council and residents that the Census takers are still active, they started on May 1st and they will be making calls and coming door-to-door. They work from about 9:00 AM until dusk. They do carry a census badge and a census briefcase so that will help identify them. If you do have any problems or concerns, I want to provide a local number that you can call, the Cleveland East Office, 216-377-4420. If there are any concerns, that's a general number you can call or you can call City Hall and our office will help to respond to questions as well, 289-8158.

The second announcement that I have is to let everyone know that our grant applicant to [efficientgovnow](http://efficientgovnow.org) has advanced to third place, the top three vote getters will receive grants. So if we stay in third place or move up to 2nd or 1st place, we will receive a grant. For those of you who might be interested in voting, you can do it online at efficientgovnow.org. Or you can call 1-877-771-5206. The project that Euclid is involved in along with all the other first suburban communities is called Let the Sun Shine. That name is to reflect the fact that we're starting a special improvement district that will help area businesses fund solar projects on the roofs of their building. As I said it has been popular, we were in 4th and as of last Thursday we moved up to 3rd place. We'll hoping to stay there or advance, so I encourage everyone who hasn't voted yet to please vote. The voting will continue until the end of the month and we want to make sure we do receive this grant. Thank you for all of you that did already take the time to vote.

Mayor Cervenik – I would like to remind everybody about Memorial Day parade, on the 31st. We will assemble at Euclid Cemetery at 7:45 for the first of a number of services to honor our veterans on Memorial Day. We will then move down to St. Paul's Cemetery at 8:15 and from there to the Slovenian Society Home on Recher Ave. We will assemble at the parade start at E. 228 Street and we will traverse from there down to the Veterans Monument in front of the Library, and the ceremony will start around 11:00. I know it will be a beautiful sunny day, it always is and we hope we can all participate. As normal, residents can line up around Lake Shore Blvd. and E. 222 Street and then please come on down to the tribute to our Veterans that begins at 11:00.

Most of you should have received our Euclid Update, the newsletter is a slightly new format this time around. We were able to use the services of a company that solicited advertising from some of our local businesses to reduce the cost for us. I think we will do that one more time this year with that company and then the other two times will be on our own. Next year we're going to hopefully do all four of the newsletters with this company. I know people got it because I've already heard some comments about the front page article on street lighting and garbage fees. There's a lot of other good things in there as well and it is our way of letting people know what's going on in the community and that will compliment what the new monthly paper, the Euclid Observer is doing. I thought last month's edition was very informative and very positive addition to communicating with the residents and we hope that continues.

I've got to tell you this, our former colleague Councilman Gruber and his wife Polly are the proud parents of a little girl, named Sara Marie. She's 4 lbs. 15 oz. She was on the small side but completely healthy. Everybody is doing good and we wish them well. Former Councilman Gruber when he text me that today he said, remind everybody that she's got a lot more hair than the Mayor does already, but that's Councilman Gruber.

A few other people to thank for Relay for Life. We had sponsors for the Survivor's dinner and that was done by Tizzano's, Beach Club Bistro and Briardale Greens Golf Course. We really do appreciate their help. There is one other person that I need to thank personally, we had an auxiliary officer there, Pam Minich. Pam stayed there the whole time and she participated in all the activities and she walked a lot of laps with us and in talking with her, she was there as much to do her job but also to honor her mother who she recently lost to cancer as well. Pam, thank you very much, Chief, she's a credit to the Auxiliary and we were very proud to have her there.

As it sounds we had a lot of fun with Relay for Life. We had 24 teams, 275 participants on those teams and many, many others who came to support those teams by donations and buying baked goods and bidding on various baskets and prizes. It really was a fun time, but at the same time it was serious and solemn. This event tries to show support for those that are suffering and going for the cure for cancer, to let them know that they do not stand alone, there's always somebody there to help them at all times. I think we really got the message across from what I saw Friday and Saturday night. Again, thanks to everyone for being there. We didn't raise that kind of money because I shaved my head. I shaved my head because we won that kind of money. The camaraderie and the friendship and meeting new friends, that 18 hours was even more heartwarming than last year. I talked with a young woman who is graduating from Euclid High School, as well as an Associate's Degree because she's in that AP where they go to college. She's an 11 year cancer survivor from Leukemia and what an uplifting attitude she had. That's what the event is all about. It is about fun, it is about remembrance of those who lost the battle and it is about being there to help those that are battling it presently. Again, thank you all, I look forward to doing it all again next year.

I do want to report that you got your tax report and finance report. Yes, we're \$100,000 over budget right now with the income tax collections. That's better than being a couple hundred thousand dollars down as we have been in the past. In a \$37 million budget, that's not a lot of money, we're being very cautious with how we're spending money. It is a positive sign and although I think May could be a tough month, May is the month we send out a lot of the refunds that people claim from over-payments. I think we're close enough on the expenditure side and the revenue side and I'm pretty confident with the changes we made we're going to get through the year just fine. That completes our reports and communications.

REPORTS & COMMITTEE MINUTES

Councilwoman Scarniench moved to approve the monthly Finance Report through April, 2010; City Growth Committee Min. of April 14, 2010; Board of Control Min. 4/26/10 & 5/3/10. Councilman O'Neill seconded. Yeas: Unanimous.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE FOR LEGISLATIVE MATTERS ONLY

Mr. Mike DiDomenico – 24770 Farrington Ave. I would like to speak about #2, which is an ordinance proposing a fine for a property owner if their property has been vandalized with graffiti, if the owner does not clean it within 72 hours of notification the owner will be fined. I think that punishing the victim is the wrong way to go here. I know the city already has ordinances on the books punishing the perpetrator if they are caught. I understand recently two of the most prolific ones were caught; kudos to the police department for that. But, I can think of numerous instances that would make it, first I just think it is wrong that you're punishing the victim. I can also think that in the dead of winter you can't possibly paint over something. If you have a brick house, you have to rent a sand blaster to get that stuff off of there.

Maybe utility companies have resources to take care of stuff. Just tonight, I personally checked again, I saw an AT&T box that has been tagged for months and is still dirty. A transformer box that happens to be in somebody's front yard, an electrical box, was tagged months ago. A city park sign in a city park that was tagged months ago. Euclid High School, months, it hasn't been cleaned off. It is very difficult. I can personally tell you that when I was walking my dog in the winter and primarily in this area around here, these most two prolific people came about and were putting their artistry for lack of a better term everywhere, I was in the Police Dept., with my dog, probably three times in the same week, going this guy got this spot, this spot, this spot. Many of them were taken care of immediately and I'm happy about that. But there's a private residence by my house that is brick and you're going to fine them on top of making them rent a sand blaster to get the crap off of there? I think hard, really hard enforcement when they catch the people, a fine if they don't want to pay the fine, throw Johnny's mom or dad in jail for 30 days and then maybe they'll think hard about whether they want to take their spray can everywhere. But punishing the victim is not the way to go.

President Holzheimer Gail – I believe it is the intent to send that back to Committee because there are a number of council members that still have concerns. We will take that into consideration.

Mr. Jason Roberts - 26300 Zeman Ave. I, too, would like to comment on Ordinance #2 and give some suggestions since you've kind of covered quite a bit. I, too, feel that it is not right to punish the victim. The ordinance it says of general offense, which is basically saying the victim has created or caused an offense. I don't think that's right.

I think this is a much bigger issue than just a simple juvenile or resident or someone tagging a home. This goes to trespassing, destruction of private property and people don't realize how serious it could be. Somebody can walk up to a house with literally only 18 inches separating that person from where my family lays their head at night. I think it is very important that you address this issue.

If it continues I could see something very bad happening. Someone comes home at night, walks outside, this is actually a much more serious issue than just someone having fun and spray painting. It is intimidation and I have concerns with that.

I'd also like to point out that a majority, not a majority but a lot of the homeowners in Euclid are 65 and older, on a fixed budget. Some of them have children and grandchildren who would be more than willing to come over and take care of that for them, but they possibly can't get there within 72 hours.

Also I believe that some type of program within the school system because a majority of the offenders are juveniles would be a good place to start. In addition, this isn't something as simple as grass growing to tall where you can send the city over and just zip over the lawn and take care of it. The constitutionality of this is what I question. You're asking people to send city employees onto private property and alter somebody's home and structure without their consent. I see law suits happening here. I see it opening to that. It might be good to look into that as well.

I know a majority of homes, a big percentage of the homes in Euclid are rentals. You have to take into consideration maybe that person lives out of town so when this is filed, is there anything set up where a certified letter goes to the owner of the home, what if they're out of town? They're not there for 72 hours, they show up and low and behold the city employees come and remove the graffiti before they have a chance to contact their insurance, their lawyer and such. Adjustment may not have been able to be made yet where the insurance company would have said, well maybe it is best to pull down the old siding and put new siding up. Now they have to pay the code violation and also deal with that.

This needs to be re-thought and I do appreciate you sending it back to Committee. Hopefully you guys can take a better look at it and come up with something better.

President Holzheimer Gail – Seeing no further comments we will move forward with legislation and item #1, please.

LEGISLATION

Ord. 78-2010 (109-10) Bluestone Blvd. Street

An ordinance accepting Bluestone Boulevard as a public street pursuant to Chapter 1313 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Euclid. (Sponsored by Mayor Cervenik and Entire Council)

Councilwoman Jones moved for passage, Councilman Wojtila seconded.

Director Smith – The vast majority of the Bluestone Blvd. infrastructure improvements have been installed. These improvements include sanitary and storm sewers, water line, pavement and traffic signals. This work was inspected and found to be in conformance with the plans and specifications. Previously council will approve the dedication of the right of way and the next step in the process is the acceptance of the street. Based upon a two year maintenance bond and a performance guaranty in the amount of \$25,000 it is my recommendation that Bluestone Boulevard be accepted as a public street.

I know Director Pietravoia has some comments to make and then I'll be glad to answer any questions you might have thereafter. One thing I did want to comment on is there was some confusion with regards to the terms of the required maintenance bond. We have a rider to address there, where ordinance requires a two year bond rather than a one year bond and that is addressed in this particular ordinance, however the amount should be in the amount of \$341,392; from the \$359,146. I apologize for that confusion.

Director Pietravoia – I just wanted to report officially for the record from the May 9, 2010 Planning & Zoning Commission. The Commission at that time voted on two motions. One you've already acted on and Director Smith indicated, that was to dedicate the Boulevard as a public right of way. Before you tonight is the acceptance of the improvements. There was a motion by Planning & Zoning at the May 9th meeting that was passed unanimously recommending that the improvements be accepted.

I just wanted to also inform Council that we are approaching completion of all the check lists required by the State for the certification of the site. That certification will put it on the State's list when they are marketing properties, actually internationally to anyone who would be interested in locating on a site of that size. We're very excited, we'll probably be one of the first in this round of job ready sites to be certified. They anticipate with the acceptance of the street and a couple of other minor matters that we're closing out with them that the certification will happen in June 2010. Mr. Novachek is here this evening and I want to thank him for coming this evening and for all the hard work they've done to get us to this point.

Councilwoman Scarniench moved to amend Section 2, to read \$341,392. Councilwoman Jones seconded.

Amendment passed.

Councilwoman Scarniench moved to close debate, Councilwoman Jones seconded. Yeas: Unanimous.

Ord. (108-10) Amend Code Graffiti

An ordinance enacting Section 529.08 of the General Offenses Code of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Euclid to require that property owners remove graffiti from their property within 72 hours of receiving notice from the City, or the City will remove the graffiti and assess the cost to the property owner. (Sponsored by Councilpersons Scarniench, Gilliam, O'Neill, Van Ho)

Councilwoman Scarniench moved for passage, Councilman Gilliam seconded.

Councilwoman Scarniench – I received many calls, e-mails and I tend to agree with most of what I've heard. I would like this to go back to Committee. I talked to Councilman Van Ho, he'd like it to be in the Housing Committee so that we can really discuss it. Councilwoman Minarik had some great idea that she got from Akron. I think we really need to look into that because I really do have a problem with charging somebody for damage that was done by somebody else. If we could do that, I'd appreciate it.

Councilwoman Scarniench moved Ord. (108-10) to the Housing and Building Standards Committee. Councilman Gilliam seconded.

Res. 79-2010 (107-10) Two Mil Sewer Levy to Electorate

A resolution declaring the amount of taxes that may be raised by a levy of the maximum rate authorized by law without a vote of the electors to be insufficient and declaring the necessity of a renewal levy in excess of such rate for the construction, maintenance, and reconstruction of sewers and providing for the submission of the question of the renewal of the current levy at the election to be held November 2, 2010. (Sponsored by Mayor Cervenik)

Councilman Wojtila moved for passage, Councilman Langman seconded.

Mayor Cervenik – This is a very important piece of legislation that we bring before the voters every 5 years. It raises approximately \$750,000 which is almost half of our budget for Streets & Sewers. It provides for the maintenance for especially our storm sewers, the maintenance of the hydro-brakes which stop the water from going into your basement, it keeps it out of your basement, and other items like that to make sure your homes stay very dry. There would be grave consequences if this was not approved by the voters. I think it has always been approved quite handily by the voters but under the circumstances I just want to make people understand that this is absolutely no increase whatsoever and it is just maintaining our basic maintenance with the present amount of funding. I strongly urge unanimous passage because if we have to cut in that department, it is not going to be pretty.

President Holzheimer Gail – So this is the renewal of our current sewer levy. It will not mean in an increase in tax dollars to the residents.

Councilman O'Neill – Real briefly, the Mayor eluded that one of the problems that this attacks is the basement flooding and how the maintenance of the hydro-brake system keeps water from entering into people's basements and how important it is that we have the finances to maintain that. I would like to ask Director Smith, if he could very briefly, there's some misunderstanding from residents in my ward about exactly, very briefly, about how the hydro-brakes system works and why it is important that it is maintained.

Director Smith – With regards to the hydro-brakes they're simply installed in the storm sewer system. The intent is to throttle the water down and let it pond in the street so some of remaining water can escape. It basically acts as a funnel to keep it in the street and let's the basements drain a little more.

Councilman O'Neill – There was some misconception as to flooding in the street, that there was a problem and that's absolutely not the problem. That's the hydro-brakes doing their job, it's the vortex

effect that slows the storm sewer water into the system and allows it to stay into the street. There was also some thought of some of the folks in my ward that there was some valves being opened up on the upper part of the city on the south-side of the city and was letting water come down into the area of Ward 4 and 5, thereabouts and that's just absolutely not true. I know it is a little bit off the subject here, but I just want to take a moment to pretty much do away with that rumor.

Mayor Cervenik – Those valves don't exist. Occasionally we do have some malfunctions in the storm sewers but part of this 2 mill sewer levy renewal allows us to maintain those and fix those and clean out the storm sewer basins on a regular basis throughout the year so when we do have heavy downfalls those things are avoided for the most part. There are some storms as we all know, on occasions where we're going to have some flooded basements but with the normal maintenance that this allows us to do, comparative to when I first started on City Council in 1989, we've come a long, long way and that is why this is so important.

Councilwoman Scarniench – I just wanted to reiterate the fact that this is a renewal. This was first passed in 1990 and it was for a five year term and each term we've successfully approved doing this because it is so important. I can remember back in 1989, my basement used to flood. Thank goodness it doesn't flood any more. That's all part of this whole thing because people were kind of confused when they saw the agenda they thought this was something we were raising their taxes and it is not raising anything, it is the same amount of money that we've been paying for twenty years.

President Holzheimer Gail – The other important note is that we're not passing this, we're placing it on the ballot in November.

Councilman Gilliam – I also want to stress my support for this as well. I've received numerous calls over the weekend. Director Smith gave me some information regarding the maintenance of the catch basins and things of that nature. It is important for our residents to know that this is not an increase of taxes, this is a renewal. Without this money some problems that do exist will continue to exist and this funding can be utilized for the routine maintenance or as the Mayor stated before. I'm in support of this, we need this and to those residents who have had some difficulties over the weekend, this is one of the things that need to be renewed and needs to be voted on and I just want to say that I'm in full support of this. Thank you.

Councilwoman Jones – My question on the alternative side is since this does have to go onto the voters in November, what are the provisions if for some reason this doesn't pass?

Mayor Cervenik – We would have to make some immediate cuts in maintenance and it would be my intention if it failed in November to get it back on the next election and make a stronger case to the residents. I hope that doesn't happen. I would like to make one correction, this levy is actually has been in existence for over 30 plus years. It used to be renewed every two years. In 1990 we asked the voters if we would allow it to last for five years. This has been 30-35 years of maintenance fees. We've pulled in approximately the same amount of dollars as we did 30 years ago because of our 920 provision. It would be a devastating blow to lose over 50% of our budget for the maintenance of our storm sewers and catch basins.

Councilwoman Jones moved to close debate, Councilwoman Minarik seconded. Yeas: Unanimous.

Ord. 80-2010 (103-10) Cracksealing Bids

An ordinance authorizing the Director of Public Service of the City of Euclid to enter into a contract, after advertising for bids for the labor and materials necessary for Cracksealing and Pavement Rejuvenation for the year 2010, in an amount not to exceed Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000.00). (Sponsored by Councilperson Wojtila by request of Service Director)

Councilman Wojtila moved for passage, Councilman Langman seconded.

Director Smith – For approximately 20 years now the city has been performing the cracksealing and pavement rejuvenation as part of our routine maintenance program. Once again I am requesting your authorization to solicit bids and enter into this contract thereafter for the 2010 calendar season.

Councilwoman Jones – Director Smith I didn't get a chance to ask my questions earlier, but on the copies of the contracts that you gave us it says 2009, is this just a sample and 2010 will be the same?

Director Frey – Yes, we've attached a copy of the 2009 contract so that you have the contract details as council has previously requested. We would enter into a new contract with whomever the successful bidder is for 2010. This is just the form of the 2009 contract for your reference.

Councilman Wojtila – When do you expect that we would be under contract and actually be doing the rejuvenation and the cracksealing?

Director Smith – Once we get through the process I would think within the next 60 days.

Councilwoman Minarik moved to close debate, Councilman Wojtila seconded. Yeas: Unanimous.

Councilwoman Minarik moved to suspend the rules, Councilman O'Neill seconded. Yeas: Unanimous.

Ord. 81-2010 (105-10) Copier Contract

An emergency ordinance authorizing the Director of Finance of the City of Euclid to extend the City-wide copier/printer system contract with Lake Business Products, 38322 Apollo Parkway, Willoughby, Ohio 44094, through December 31, 2010, and to enter into a contract, after receiving proposals, for another 3-year contract, with 2 one-year options to renew to be effective January 1, 2011. (Sponsored by President Holzheimer Gail by request of Finance Director)

Councilman Gilliam moved for passage, Councilwoman Scarniench seconded.

Director Johnson – We are currently in a contract with lake Business Products and we have been for the last five years to provide copier systems to the entire city. The contract is set to expire next month in June and what I'm requesting is authority to extend the existing contract to the end of the year and before the end of the year I would take bids and hopefully secure the new vendor for the fiscal year 2011 and for initially three years beyond that with two additional years to renew.

The advantage to doing this is we'd finally be able to bring our copier contract into line with our fiscal contract so that for budgeting purposes they will both be in line with the same dates. If there are any questions, I'd be glad to answer them. I believe with the current contract is attached to the piece of legislation that you received which shows the amount of the three year contract. It amounts to a base price of about \$39,000 a year. I believe our costs have actually been in the neighborhood of \$45,000-\$50,000 because there are some months that we do have overages and you can see in the contract that there is a charge for the overage amount. We have a total of 32 copiers scattered throughout the entire city. This company has done a wonderful job of maintaining the equipment and being very responsive to all of our service calls. If there are any questions, I'd be glad to answer them.

Councilwoman Minarik moved to close debate, Councilwoman Jones seconded. Yeas: Unanimous.

Councilman O'Neill moved to suspend the rules, Councilman Wojtila seconded. Yeas: Unanimous.

Ord. 82-2010 (106-10) Amend Board of Control Bid Criteria

An ordinance enacting Section 109.023 of the Administration Code of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Euclid to provide criteria to be used when the City is determining the lowest and best bidder for a contract. (Sponsored by Mayor Cervenik)

Councilman Langman moved for passage, Councilwoman Minarik seconded.

Director Frey – You probably were unaware all the times that you sat for Board of Control that we actually had criteria or rules for evaluating bids before we make contract awards. In fact the Board of Control adopted a rule in July 1988 and it was our determination, discussion with the Mayor that we would be better served if we published these rules as part of our codified ordinances to all of the vendors

so they would have that information available to them when they consider providing bids for goods and services to the city.

There are a couple of additions. First we added a provision in Section C, that as a requirement from the State Auditor that we go onto the Auditor's website, that we determine any vendor, potential vendor with the city has a finding for recovery against them, which would disqualify them for a contract. We've actually added that as a provision.

I will note that while it was part of the original rules proposed and adopted by the Board of Control, we separated it out as its own Section B, that Euclid vendors would receive under this criteria at 2% of preference if you will. So that their bid would be the same as an outside of the city bid if it is within 102% of that low bid and we can consider that. It does not mean that they necessarily get the award, but it would essentially mean that their bid offer was the same price-wise as an out of city bidder. I know other communities are looking at that bid preference for homegrown materials. That's been part of our rules since 1988. To be very honest, for the six years I've sat on Board of Control, I'm not sure we've ever used it. We've considered it but we've never been within that close of a tolerance where it is coming into play.

Councilman Langman – Just reading through it on its own merits, it seems like 1 & 2 could be easily combined with just a few changes in phrases rather than having a whole separate section; any governmental agency or entity. It is not a big deal but it just jumped out, you cover any governmental work, I think that would cover the city and obviously any other entity.

Director Frey – You are right, it could have been combined. It was again part of the old rules that we just rolled out. Again what we're trying to point out there is not only are we going to look at your prior work as a contractor with the City of Euclid, but if we know that you had public contracts outside agencies, we could consider those and your performance on those contracts as well. But you're right, it could have been combined into a single section.

Councilman Langman- Since I've been retired from Board of Control for several years, has Section 1 or 2, have they ever caused or created a dis-incentive to bid on items that the city maybe asking for? In other words they read, I haven't worked in the city before, is that a dis-incentive for qualified bidders?

Director Frey – I would think all of us who've been on Board of Control, today may have been an exception where we had just a single bidder on a gear, and I'm not sure I understand exactly what the gear components were for waste water. Typically with the exception of chemicals for waste water, we have had an increase in the number of companies that have submitted bids. I would say, no, that has not been a dis-incentive, I think we have some pretty specialized commodities like the chemicals or some particular manufacturing process where we have a tendency to receive few bids, but otherwise I would say just the opposite as the economy really dictates how many vendors we get to bid and we've had an increase in the number in the last several years.

Councilman Gilliam – Director Frey, I just want to piggyback on what Councilman Langman is stating. I assumed that the city doesn't have this other rating system it just lists the criteria for the lowest and best bidder. The only concern that I have and maybe I overlooked it and if you find it for me I would definitely like to be corrected on this one. Section A, it talks about the lowest bid, and then it goes into define exactly what the lowest and best bid is. Previous language and other entities have used most responsive as well. I'm curious that I don't see that language in here, such as being responsive to the actual RFP and things of that nature because sometimes that is an interpretation and I just wanted to get clarity on that.

Director Frey – To answer that, other entities do use that phrase, lowest and most responsive. I believe the RTA uses that but I think we were paradigm and maybe we should move to amend. I think it is a term of art if you will and again I don't think we've had an issue with vendors or potential vendors being dissuaded from providing bids. The Mayor and I have talked about other provisions that we may want to look at in the future and perhaps that would be the appropriate time to switch our language in all the respective code sections so that it reads lowest and most responsive or best and most responsive. We'll look for guidance from some other samples.

Councilman Gilliam – Just one last question, would it be a detriment to look at the possibility, Councilman Langman's request, not request, comment, to say that we may combine 1 & 2, just so, for lack of better word, kind of make it more concise, more lucid, and maybe less paper?

Director Frey – If it is the desire of Council to amend this just to merge Section 1 & 2, we'll be more than happy to do that in the final version.

Councilman Gilliam – There's plenty of other entities that we respect that contractors may have had a long standing relationship with that may want to work with Euclid. While they don't see this as a disincentive, they may see it as a possibility that they could look at this, as the Councilman has stated this is maybe I don't have a chance because I've never worked in Euclid and haven't paid taxes in Euclid and those things, they may just be circumstance, but just having 1 & 2 combined minimizes the possibility and the questioning of it.

Director Frey – Why don't we do that, if you'll move to amend so that #1 reads, past performance by the bidder on city or other governmental agency contracts for the same or similar work, we will then just strike section 2 and renumber the balance of them, so that 3 becomes 2 and so forth.

Councilman Gilliam – I did hear the language but I didn't write it all down, you're saying, past performance by the bidder on city contracts or other governmental agency contracts for same or similar work?

Director Frey – Yes.

Councilman Gilliam moved to amend in Section 1 of Section 109.023 to state, subsection 1, past performance by the bidder on city contracts or other governmental agencies for the same or similar work. Councilman Langman seconded.

Councilman Wojtila – I just have another suggested edit and that's on #8.

President Holzheimer Gail – If it is not about that, can we vote on that amendment first?
Any questions on the amendment?

Councilwoman Jones – This is just combining the 1 & 2?

President Holzheimer Gail – Yes.

Director Frey- So that would read, the number of years the vendor/contractor has been actively engaged.

Councilman Wojtila – The now would still be bidder, the number of years the bidder has been actively engaged as a vendor/contractor in the industry. Remove construction as well.

Director Frey – Fine, that's certainly adequate.

Ord. 77-2010 (104-10) Amend Note-Various Purposes

An emergency ordinance amending Ordinance No. 54-2010 which provides for the issuance and sale of notes of the City of Euclid, Ohio, in anticipation of the issuance of Bonds, in a principal amount now estimated not to exceed \$9,380,000 for various purposes, ratifying the sale of the notes. (Sponsored by Mayor Cervenik and All Members of Council by request of the Director of Finance)

Councilwoman Scarniench moved for passage, Councilwoman Jones seconded.

Director Johnson – If you recall back in April Council adopted legislation authorizing me to issue debt for the 2010 Capital budget and we also renewed some notes from previous years. It was discovered after that, that we have a little bit of an issue of the maturity date. All this legislation is doing is asking you to change the effective maturity date of the notes that will be issued, actually tomorrow. The original maturity date was from 9 months to a year from their date of their issuance, that was the language in the ordinance. We discovered with a maturity date of December 1st, we would be 18 days short of the 9 months. If you look at Section 2 of the legislation that is in front of you, it changes the maturity date from between six months and one year which gives us the flexibility. We are thinking that sometimes towards the end of the year the market conditions will be right to roll these into permanent financing or bonds and this change in the maturity date will give us the flexibility to do that towards the end of the year.

These changes represent the last of the proposals the CRC sent to the voters. It is no secret that the city has undergone drastic changes the past few years. The Charter is a living document that needed to adapt itself to these changes. The Charter Review Commission was tasked with reviewing the charter and recommending changes that would best prepare the city for its future. Fortunately the voters agreed with all the changes we recommended and our charter and our city is stronger for it.

I ask tonight for Council to present one more change to the voters in the November election. That is cleaning up the conflicting language in Article 10 of the Charter. Since all CRC meetings are public and televised afterwards on TV, there's plenty of opportunity to understand the reasoning and publicly participate if they so choose.

The next Charter Review Commission will be picked by both Council and the administration. It maybe difficult to find members to serve if they feel they will be second guessed by the very people who picked them. I urge this Council to bring a Charter Amendment forward to change the word, "may" in Article 10 Section 1, to "shall" and forever close this loop hole.

This event is called Youth Explosion and is designed to showcase for both the city's youth and their parents the many programs available for youth in our city. This event will be held at Moore Counseling Center at 22639 Euclid Ave., from 10 AM until 4 PM. Along with the programs being showcased, there will also be fun activities for the kids, as well as free hot dogs and refreshments. I sent all Council an e-mail on this last week asking for your support and I've heard back from a few of you so far and hope to hear from the rest soon. I also find out tonight that some of the fun activities we were planning are going to cost us a lot of money, so if there's anybody else who would like to contribute, please let me know.

I urge all parents and youth to attend and see what is being offered. Again, this will be held on Saturday, June 12 from 10 AM until 4 PM at Moore Counseling Center, flyers will be available soon.

Mayor Cervenik – I just feel compelled to make a few responses. I think it is only fair to the event itself and to the people who have participated. First to the family issues, my secretary did go up and introduce herself to Marcus Epps. It was a very, from what I heard, a very civil and kind conversation. I commend her for doing so. My secretary is my wife's cousin, so she is my cousin by marriage. She started working for the City at the age of 17. She became Paul Oyaski when he was the Director of Community Development, his secretary, followed Paul Oyaski when Paul Oyaski became Law Director as his Administrative Assistant. Became Paul Oyaski's administrative assistant when he was Mayor for eight years and before I ran for Mayor, I asked that young woman if she would work for me because of all the experience she has.

The conversation that I was not privy to because I wasn't there during that time, I had other fundraising events, I wasn't to get back to later, I can't speak of. But, there is emotion in times like this when a young woman such as Colleen has breast cancer and is pulled into a political foray in front of Council. Having said that, I will leave it at that. Colleen is as admirable woman. She's a very strong woman going through a very difficult time in her life and we're all very proud of her.

As to the criticism of not understanding what to do or accusing Katie Crea who is not one of my people because I really don't have one of my people, she is an employee of the American Cancer Society. I don't know where that comes from. There were notifications, every team that signed up of all of these meetings, there was ample time to be there. I feel extremely terrible that some members of the Epps team felt they were discriminated against for whatever reason. I hope there's no other teams out there that feel that way. We will try to do an even better job next year to make sure that there is not that confusion. We don't run this. We provide the venue, we do all the work, the participants do all the fundraising, but the American Cancer Society organizes all the money collection, the website and all that. I do feel bad that you feel that way. Please come back next year. I think your experience will be better. There were a number of teams last year, I think most of the teams last year for their first time didn't know what to expect. After last year we knew what to expect and teams that participated in the prior year were fundraising all summer long, all winter long, because they figured it out and maybe American Cancer Society maybe Kathy and I will make sure that any new teams that sign up next year understand the various things you can do and the fun we can have. Again I will say the camaraderie and friendship and togetherness that was experienced in Euclid on the 14th & 15th was phenomenal and I hope it grows and grows. Thank you.

COUNCILMEN'S COMMENTS

Councilwoman Jones – I wanted to say that I had the opportunity to attend a Family Night on Wednesday, May 12 at the Kingdom Community Worship Center on the corner of Beverly Hills Drive and Euclid Ave. It was a great event. As the previous speaker mentioned the guest speaker for that evening was Devin Wyman who played for the New England Patriots. He goes around to different schools doing motivational speaking to different school aged children on how to turn their life around; it doesn't matter where they are in life, they can always do something positive. It started out as an evening that I wasn't really sure what was going to happen, but the whole event and his whole speech and everything was very uplifting. He actually took a steel bar and if you've ever seen him, he is 6'8" 335 pounds. He still looks like he plays football. He took a steel bar and actually bent that in his mouth into a U-shape. He talked about how you can turn your life around; if you're going down into what maybe the bottom of life, which he said at one point his life was, you can always turn your life around and do a u-turn in your life. It was

very motivational and very inspiring to see somebody do that. He did actually have people in the audience touch it to make sure it was a real steel bar and it was real. It is amazing to see. So if you get the opportunity as it was mentioned at the Shore Cultural Centre as he was going to be there for that event, please take the opportunity to go and see him. You will definitely be surprised and overwhelmed by the outcome and the remarks that he does say. I look forward to seeing him at other events also. We want to try to get him back for the Euclid School system, sometime next year.

As the previous speaker mentioned, Youth Explosion on June 12th, will be an event that is for youth, adults and anybody who wants to come. There will be a lot of activities and programs there. I did want to mention that I did attend the Relay for Life, this is my second year in attending. My first year was last year of attending a Relay for Life event and my first year I didn't know what to expect and I didn't get a chance to go to any of the meetings, and I had a team of my own, I just relied on the e-mails that I got. Once getting there because I had been to other fundraising events, it turned out to be a very nice event this year as well. People were walking and I'm sorry the speaker did not have a positive influence. I took it upon myself not to worry about what other people were doing, I just got up and walked, and walked and walked and walked. From the outcome of Saturday, I spent most of my Saturday afternoon trying to recover from that. It was definitely a worthwhile event for a very worthy cause. Everybody knows somebody who is afflicted or if they haven't themselves been afflicted with cancer. The research is definitely needed and the funds for the research are definitely needed. My last remark, the Prom for Euclid is coming up soon, so those who are participating in the prom, please make sure that you drive, safely, carefully, look out for other drivers. This is the time of the season where accidents happen because of careless drivers on the other's person part. Have a good time at the prom and please be careful. For those who are graduating this year, good luck on your graduations and hope to see you in the future.

Councilwoman Minarik – This Saturday from 10:30-5:00 is East 185 Alive. 10:30 a parade starts out on the south end of 185 and heads north towards Lake Shore Blvd. Last year was very good, so I'm sure this one will be too. After the parade it will be sidewalk sales from all the merchants and hopefully we'll have some garage sales on the side streets. I urge everyone to check out 185.

Thursday, May 27, I'm having a Ward 4 meeting, flyers are being passed around. It will be at Recher Hall from 6:30 until 9:30. It is an ideas format which means that the residents themselves will join one of three groups whether its housing, safety or youth, with people from the city there. Then the residents will identify the situations, decide to do something about the situations in their neighborhoods, educate themselves on what is and is not available, take action, solve the situation. It is basically a neighborhood empowerment type of thing. Kristal Skovira will be facilitating it. The flyers are being delivered door-to-door but they'll also be in storefronts, probably next week. That's Thursday, May 27, 6:30 until 9:30 at Recher Hall.

The next thing I wanted to talk about is at the Colony Theater last week, we had the privilege, I know Director Pietravoia was there, Councilman O'Neill was there and Jim Sonnhalter, I think that's it from the City of Euclid. But we got to here Donovan Rypkema based in Washington, D.C., his strength is talking about the economic benefits of historic preservation. He talked about sustainability on three levels, which are economic, environmental and cultural. Everyone thinks sustainability is all about the environment, but Donovan was phenomenal in that he showed how economic sustainability focusing on small businesses, very, very important. Then he went into cultural sustainability, which I'm very pleased that my colleague was there to hear because it brought Shore Cultural Centre to my mind. He talked about how important it is to preserve your culture, your history, your heritage. We are part of the world, but we're really also part of Euclid, Ohio, America and we need to remember who we are as Americans. It was a really, really good talk because the three of them worked together. The Colony was a beautiful theater that has been restored with millions and millions of dollars.

Which leads me to my final point, when I moved to Euclid, I was an independent and at that time Councilman Dan Flowers came knocking at the door, he was running for office. My friend Danny White told him to talk to me and Dan Flowers convinced me to work for him and then to register as a democrat and then run for precinct and all that stuff which I did do and I have been a democrat for 20 years. I joined the Democratic party because I believed it was a grassroots organization that cared about the people. But over the last few months I've seen that when the will of the people is not followed through and when America the land of opportunity is no longer the land of opportunity, but now everyone has the right to do everything, they have the right to own a home. We have rights of life, liberty and the pursuit

of happiness. At any rate, the point is, that I did switch parties last week at the election and registered as a Republican. So it is going to be interesting to see what the Republican party offers. I may end up becoming an Independent in two more years.

I have one final question, I believe we have legislation requiring the dumpsters be in driveways. The house on 195, the two houses that the city owns on 195, the dumpster is in the middle of the front yard. On the other house on 195 we own, the dumpster is in the driveway closer to the sidewalk, when there's room to having it pushed back. If the residents aren't allowed to put dumpsters on the middle of their front lawns, I think that the City should follow suit. It was in the driveway and then today it is in the middle of the yard. Is there a way we can fix that and with that good night.

Director Pietravoia – Absolutely, we'll make sure the contractors following the same rules that everyone else is obligated to. Thank you.

Councilman O'Neill – Just to kind of piggyback on what Councilwoman Minarik was saying about the Capital Theater on West 65th and Detroit, they did a phenomenal job with the restoration of that building. It extends not only from the building, but to surrounding stores and there are some theater groups going on over there and some restaurants. It was a long time coming, I was able to talk to Councilman Matt Zone, that represents Ward 15 in Cleveland. I did have a pretty good personal conversation with Donovan Rypkema, hopefully I didn't butcher his last name, it is kind of tough to pronounce. But anyhow, he has some really good insights about solar energy and what people think solar can do and his take on what it is all about. It is eye opening and I did learn quite a bit from that, so I'm glad that Director Pietravoia sent out that e-mail and I was able to attend.

I want to send out condolences to Ruth Fedele on the passing of her sister, Marge Cali, who was interned today. She's actually a resident of Ward 4, right on the border of Ward 5, so our condolences out to the Fedele family.

This week, starting Thursday in Cleveland is the Police Memorial Weekend. On Thursday, there's a welcoming reception, the main hotel is the Crown Plaza Hotel right next to Public Hall. This is a celebration of the law enforcement and remembrance of police officers killed in the line of duty. Unfortunately we have a member of our police dept. that his name is on the wall, one of the three black granite slabs, George Brentar, he's been there for a couple of years now, unfortunately he died in the line of duty. Tickets are available at the public hall ticket office. If you go to the Greater Cleveland Peace Officer Memorial society's website, you can Google that and it will give you the ticket information. The show is on Saturday at Public Hall and there's approximately 1,000 participants in this parade and there's bands from all over the United States, as well as Canada; bagpipe bands, brass bands, one of the Marine Corps bands from the D.C area will be there as well as the Silent Drill Team from the Air Force who rivals the Marine Corps Silent Drill Team. There's various other bands and flyer information on that website. With that, I again give my condolences to the Fedele family and wish everyone good night.

Councilman Wojtila – Director Smith, I forgot to mention on the first item on the Agenda tonight was the traffic light at Bluestone, it doesn't seem to align very well when you're heading west out of Bluestone onto 260 Street. Is there any work planned for that?

Director Smith – At this time there is not. We've had a couple different meetings, both internally and with the Fogg Builders and there was some concern expressed with that. It is certainly not the ideal situation out there, but I do believe it will function. The intent there was to line up the physical property center lines which was done. That's pretty much the best scenario we could have without a pretty major change on the Euclid Mall side.

Councilman Wojtila – The only concern would be traffic may not know to obey that signal. It is so far aligned, okay if you could look at that. Director Pietravoia, any update on the revisions to the home occupation and the legislation on the Land Bank policy?

Director Pietravoia – We do, plan as I said at the last meeting to try to get with individual members and have something back to Council before your recess. I'm not sure that we'll have something ready to pass. We may have to look at Fall or if there are any special meetings during the summer. We just haven't been able to get to it yet, quite honestly.

Councilman Wojtila – To me the home occupation one is a high priority. I'm not sure, that was at Committee and then went back to Council? Back to P&Z?

President Holzheimer Gail – It was voted down at Council.

Director Pietravoia – We'll be preparing a new ordinance that will be re-introduced and it will have to be referred to Planning & Zoning since it is part of the zoning code. Before we prepare that ordinance and re-introduce it, we wanted to talk with a couple members of Council and do a little more research. The primary concern was actually a little bit outside of what we thought the ordinance would cover, but there were a lot of questions and concern about daycare and that requires some research with the State to see if our local zoning code can override some of the allowances that the State provides in their rules.

Councilman Wojtila – I will be monitoring that closely. Director Will, is there still a clean up scheduled for this Saturday the 22nd and what is involved with that?

Director Will – I apologize for not mentioning that earlier, but there is a clean up scheduled for this Saturday, May 22 between the hours of 9:00-Noon. They should report here behind City Hall and they will at that point get their area of where they can clean up, they'll be given the garbage bags and the rubber gloves, their assignment and then they'll come back here to City Hall and we will have pizza and pop for everyone here. That's from 9:00-Noon this Saturday, May 22nd.

Councilman Wojtila – With that I'll say goodnight.

Councilman Langman – First Director Smith, if you can, can you update where we are with 248th St. project; it is moving along quickly and the sooner it gets done the better.

Director Smith – I will certainly do that and if possible I'd like to touch base on several other projects because there has been several inquiries from different members. With regards to the 248 budget, the storm, the sewer and the water main installation is now complete. There's approximately three weeks of lateral installation to go and the pavement will follow thereafter. The project has gone extremely smooth to-date, knock on wood.

With regards to the 264 project, the utility installation is well underway on that project. Again it is right on scheduled.

The 214, I know everyone will be glad to hear the northbound paving will be completed next week, weather permitting, unless something unforeseen occurs. Next was the waterline replacement project on Drakefield, Briardale, Brush and Nicholas. This project is approximately 50% complete.

The Dille Road/E. 204 project, we have approximately two weeks worth of work left and some landscaping to follow thereafter. Today on the citywide signalization project we did a final inspection. As you may recall that was about a \$3.5 million project that is coming to conclusion. Next week on the Board of Control we will be finalizing our paving bid for the 2010 year. The amount of that contract will be in the amount of \$750,000. Then I was pleased that we signed two additional contracts with the OPWC that we will begin on the engineering, we'll get that underway on Crystal and Bruce and the portion of the 266 project. We definitely have, I didn't do the math on this, but I would say close to \$15 million worth of projects that are in some stage. A lot of that is funded with grant monies and it is certainly keeping us busy.

Councilman Langman – Very good, I appreciate that. I had the opportunity to attend the Shore Cultural Centre Open House over the weekend, I know Councilwoman Scarniench was there too and I'm not sure if anybody else attended. But, I came away after attended it with just such a sense of energy and vitality coming out of that building, it was really fantastic to see. They are drawing in new tenants, new artists, new programs. We should all be very proud that the building is on the right track. I know it was mentioned about the Colony Theater, the whole West 65th Street district, that took many, many years to pull off and we're on just the opening stages of what we hope to be a focus for arts and culture, not only for Euclid, but this part of Northeast Ohio. That energy will serve our Downtown and beyond very, very well.

I hope to see you all at the Memorial Day parade. It is perhaps one of our most significant secular holidays. It should remind us all that we can be in this chamber and disagree, have debate, and the reason why we have that opportunity is because men and women have given their lives to defend those rights and freedoms for well over 250 years. Remember, please come out to the Memorial Day parade, it is always a very solemn and meaningful occasion.

Finally, I was handed a note to recognize someone I know very well, Ron Seymour from Euclid Senior High Principal, various teacher, Asst. Principal. He will be retiring at the end of this school year after 42 years. I don't know him as Ron Seymour administrator, I know him as Ron Seymour Head Coach of the Euclid Panthers. He was my Head Coach when I played there. I had the opportunity to start for him for two years and there are many, many stories I can share with all of you, but I will not. I know if Mike Brown is watching somewhere, I'll round him up and we'll give Mr. Seymour the appropriate send off in our own way. With that, I'll say goodnight.

President Holzheimer Gail – I would like to remind everyone that we have an Executive & Finance Committee Meeting this Wednesday at 6:30. The agenda will be a budget performance review, an update on the implementation of the garbage and lighting fees and beginning our discussion of long term budget stabilization activities and ideas, so come prepared with ideas.

We will have a follow up meeting to that because we have the consolidated compensation ordinance in committee and there will be suggestions from both the Law Dept. and we have Councilwoman Minarik's suggestions the following week, either Monday or Wednesday, depending on schedules. We'll make sure we get that one scheduled and notice out as soon as that date is set.

The Hunger Center is having a fundraiser this Thursday the 20th from 4:30 until 6:30 at Paradise Pub on Babbitt Road. I was also going to remind folks about the clean up before Councilman Wojtila reminded us. But I did want to thank Sue McGinn and Dave Carlson and Kathy Will and the members of the Shade Tree Commission and the Rec Commission for pulling that together. It started at the Adopt-A-Spot meeting at the Spring Fling. We through out ideas and Sue McGinn took it and ran with it and pulled some partners together. This is a real resident led initiative and if you can't participate by coming to City Hall and working with a group, take the time to walk on your street and pick up some litter or do it around your house. I think every little bit helps and it just reinforces that commitment that we all have that this is our community and it is all our responsibility to help make it look better.

Again I hope to see everyone at the Memorial Day Parade and just wanted to end with a question to Law Director Frey. We do have rules that cover our public discussions here, they apply to both council members and residents. The public portions are meant to be the for good of the city, they prohibit any personal attacks or comments that are meant to embarrass or humiliate people. I was pretty lax today, but do you have an opinion on whether it is for the good of a campaign or a specific person, whether those type of comments are allowable or Out of Order, or we can think about that and come back to it.

Director Frey – I would suggest again that we would look at Codified Ordinance 121.18 as it talks about the Committee of the Whole and the subject matter. These are ordinances that from time to time Council should review, it seems to me and perhaps update as appropriate. I would have to go through this entire section before I could tell you whether it was my opinion those were out of order or not. I'll do so and advise you.

President Holzheimer Gail – I certainly want to have public comments and include participation by all but make sure that we are all following by the same rules and of course sticking to the standards that we have written. I will get back to Council about more information about that and announce it publicly.

Councilman Gilliam – First and foremost I want to thank the City for the quick response. There was a tree that fell down on Glen Russ. I called it in around 8:30, I was driving around the neighborhood this past Friday after the storm and basically it was cut up and the street was cleared by 9:30. Within an hour the tree was removed and it was a pretty large sized tree and it blocked three-quarters of the roadway and residents had a hard time getting out during work hours but I was glad to see that it was done. I did receive an e-mail from Director Smith regarding some of the issues of flooding on Shawnee. I was pretty much comfortable with that but I did want to point out that in driving in some of the areas, I noticed that there were various catch basins that were extremely clogged with a lot of debris. I think that may play a part in some of these basements actually flooding. An example would be my neighbor who lives up the street from me on Pontiac was complaining about his basement flooding and through the city's research and through his own personal research the catch basin was clean and low and behold he didn't get a flood at all after the situation was taken care of. I just wanted to make sure that we keep up the maintenance or we can concentrate on areas where there seems to be repetitive flooding. Director Smith will pass those locations onto for you to look into.

The Euclid Villa Neighborhood association, I know it has been in hiatus for a long time, Kristal Skovira will be passing out letters and e-mailing people about a meeting on May 26. I believe it is at 7 PM, I know it is at Indian Hills Elementary School. I will nail down the time, if anyone does have any questions they can call me at 216-383-0061. I have no problem, for some reason I believe it is at 7, but 6:30 keeps ringing into my mind.

Director Pietravoia, you and I have talked about Indian Hills shopping mall and I know that I gave you a reference to Valu King, a division of Giant Eagle and I know you've made several attempts and we've kind of been playing phone tag with the Regional Vice-President of Giant Eagle. Have you been able to make any type of e-mail or personal contact with this individual at this time?

Director Pietravoia – I did attempt again, through his secretary. I have still not been able to talk to him personally, she assures me that he is getting the messages and I'm hopeful that I will get a return call. I will continue to try, perhaps at some point we could even try to call together.

Councilman Gilliam – Perhaps we could just ride to Pittsburgh.

Director Pietravoia – We could do that.

Councilman Gilliam – Thank you kindly. The issues that some of the residents have been stating as far as the flooding in the basement, that's a huge concern of mine. I want to point out to the residents as well that there is a cost associated with those things. As we look to try to find ways to increase revenue and to maximize the ability of our budget, there will be some good things putting out that residents will like and there will be some things that residents may have an aversion to such as the garbage and the lighting assessments. These things are necessary to maintain services, at the same time sustain the city until we're able to return from this economy and begin to increase our revenue. It is important to me that we basically look at every option available to the city whether unpleasant or not because we are facing a time where money is short, people are leaving and we're not the only city that is going through this. I propose to the residents out there to give Council and the Mayor some time. There will be some things said that will be pleasant and unpleasant, but they're all in for the best interest of the city. We are hoping and I am very much hopeful that we will come to some resolutions down the road that will best suit our city for sustainability, will bring people in and at the same time make us a little bit more stable in our budget. With that I will close out. Thank you very much.

Councilwoman Scarniench – You already spoke about the Euclid Hunger Center fundraiser this Thursday, so I won't do that. But, if you have nothing to do on Friday, May 28th, the beginning of Memorial Day weekend, there will be an all you can eat rib dinner at Sticks, followed by the Midnight Sun band. They'll have music from 7:00-10:00. They play jazz to blues, to classic rock. If you haven't had a chance to go there and try the ribs, they're fantastic. I hope to see you there.

We talked about the clean up on the 22nd. The Boy Scouts and hopefully my cemetery crew will be out at the cemetery probably about 9:30 on Friday, doing some touch ups. Anyone who would like to join us, bring your gloves, bring your rake and come and join us. There's not a lot to do, we did a lot last year, a lot of painting was done to make the cemetery look good. If you are so inclined you can join us there on Friday and then we can go piggyback and eat pizza behind City Hall.

Public service, here's one. Euclid Police Dept. Bike Auction, a favored event of the year. Saturday, June 12th starting promptly at 10:00 AM. There are no previews so you can't come in and see anything ahead of time. Cash or check. They have good bikes, old bikes, things that are good for parts. But it is always a fun event and it will be held at the Old Fire Station, the East-End Mini-Station. That's at 10 AM on June 12th.

Ditto on Councilman Langman about the Open House. It was very nice. There were lots of people at Shore. I got to go to the Culinary School, that was the first time for lunch and I actually was able to cut a steak with a plastic knife, it was awesome. It was a fun event, everybody that was there was just so welcoming. It was nice to see all the culture and arts, it was really great. Kudos to them and good luck.

I attended the Euclid Boys League fundraiser this past week and that was another phenomenal event. Lots and lots of people, lots and lots of prizes, of course I didn't get anything, but kudos to them. They've been able to actually save their program, they were on the verge of maybe not having a Boys League any more and they have successfully made a go of it and they're doing phenomenal and they're looking for coaches. They are actually turning kids away because they don't have enough coaches. I don't have a phone number, but if you're interested, I would imagine Director Will would have a phone number if you're interested in coaching.

The Charter issue that Mr. Beck spoke about. I do have legislation that will be presented at our next meeting, exactly for that reason. It is very evident to me that the people of Euclid pay attention and they do their homework on what needs to be done. As he said, I don't believe the founding fathers meant it for us to debate what the Charter Commission says. It should be a pass-through, this will be a Charter amendment so I'm hoping my colleagues will vote for it so it will be on the ballot in November.

I along with Councilwoman Jones and the Mayor, two weeks ago got to go to John Carroll to participate in We the People. It is a program that has to do with government and the program that we were involved with is actually Mock Congressional Hearings. It was very exciting. All three of us were new and most of the people on our teams were new so it was a fun event. That was for 8th graders. I'm going again this Wednesday and those are the 6th graders. It was really wonderful and I know St. Williams from our city is one of the participants in the program and I'm looking forward to that and seeing some of the kids.

I want to thank Denny Bucar for getting rid of my two deer this morning. One was okay because it was on the trees, but the other one was in the street and if you would have come around the corner, not knowing it was there, it could have caused you a serious accident. Thank you Denny and the guys in his crew.

Director Smith – I'll do my best to have that list to you certainly within I would say 1-2 weeks. The reason why the delay, we did go out for bid obviously, but we're still trying to coordinate some of the restoration work associated with the Issue 1 projects. We're trying to focus a little more and I think I eluded to at one meeting there's some work on the mains and we're just starting to put everything together so that when we do go out to bid, we have a very complete detail of how we're going to accomplish this work. It is not a matter that we don't have some lists, but they're still subject to change as we continue the process. I will have you that detailed list for all of these items.
