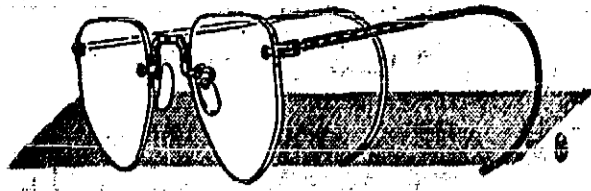

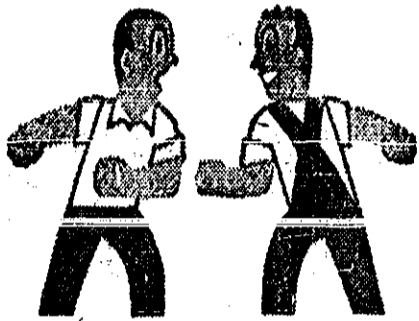

Smash East For Championship And Charity Game Spot

Last Saturday afternoon the fast stepping Railroaders took over the East High Blue Bombers by land and air to the tune of 33-0 to clinch the East Side Senate Championship and a berth in the Charity Game. Collinwood completely baffled East High by a surge of passes in the first half, then came back in the second half to show East High their great running attack which they are famous for every year.

The break in the game came when Tony "T" Adamle intercepted an East pass late in the first quarter and raced 50 yards down the sidelines before Stan Carras of East stopped him on the 25 yard line. The next play gave Collinwood its first touchdown of the afternoon on a pass from Pete Palumbo to Lenny Heiss. Bob Zaman kicked the extra point and the score was 7-0. The second quarter had no sooner started when Collinwood again filled the air with passes to score again on a pass from Tony Adamle to "Butch" Canavino. Bob Zaman again converted and the half ended with the score 14-0 in favor of Collinwood.

In the third quarter Collinwood came back strong with their running attack, scoring twice with Canavino and Palumbo going over for touchdowns and Perrotti converting one extra point to make the score 27-0. In the final period with the Collinwood lineup riddled with substitutions Tony Adamle went over for the final score of the game. The closest East got to the Collinwood goal line was the 14 yard line early in the first period but never threatened after that.

Collinwood has out-played and out-classed all its opponents so far this year but it will have a hard time out-paying and out-classing the Co-Lake Erie Champions, the Lakewood High Purple and Gold Rangers. The Rangers have yet to lose a game on their home field since their new stadium was built, although they have been tied. The Purple and Gold have scored 101 points to their

opponents 53, with Tommy Phillips of Berea scoring 20 of the 53 points against them.

Lakewood has a backfield that rates with the best in the state in Lenny Benlow at quarterback, Hugh Jones at left halfback, Cliff Lewis at right halfback, and Dick Jenkins at fullback. All played on the Lakewood basketball team which was runner up in the Class A State Basketball Championship last winter. They all stand close to 6 feet or over, composing one of the biggest backfields in the state and one of the best. This combination averages about 185 pounds.

This game, matching two of the best eleven's in the state, should bring out all of the Collinwood student body and alumni to cheer the Railroaders on to victory. Even if Collinwood loses they still play in the Charity Game and this would make the Lake Erie League a tougher one than the Senate. So, if Collinwood wins Saturday it will prove conclusively that the Senate is a tougher league than the Lake Erie League, as Collinwood has already beaten Shaw, the other Co-Lake Erie League Champ. 3 Waterloo Plants Had \$225,000 Fire Loss Saturday

Two Waterloo rd. industrial plants and one warehouse suffered heavy losses Saturday morning in a fire that started in the plant of the Pla-Wood Products Co., 16702 Waterloo rd. The fire then spread east to the plant of the International Vibration Co., 16702 Waterloo rd., and the warehouse of the American Steel Suppliers,

Inc., 16700 Waterloo rd. International Vibration losses were placed at \$150,000 by officials; \$50,000 at Pla-Wood and \$25,000 at American Steel. Fire officials fixed the total loss at \$325,000.

Fire started in the boiler room of Pla-Wood and a high wind fanned the flames so that they spread through the entire building and swept to the adjoining structure.

Although eight pumps and two hose and ladder companies responded to the four-alarm, Pla-Wood was a total loss, and firemen had difficulty in holding down the damage to the adjoining structures.

Heat snapped electric wires and windows in stores across the street. One spectator dropped dead of heart failure, caused by the excitement.

Louis J. Newman, head of the Pla-Wood company, criticized the quality of the fire apparatus, and said much of it was about 25 years old.

Pla-Wood manufactures wood novelties. International Vibration makes vibrators for highways and railway tracks.

Among the apparatus at the fire were the two pieces from the East 152nd st. station. Spectators say hose from the antiquated pumper gave way and showered the spectators.

At a fire Monday at Phillip's Upholstering, St. Clair ave. and East 124th st., the old pumper ran into more bad luck. The fire plug they tried to hook onto was jammed from an auto collision. They stood by and didn't pump.

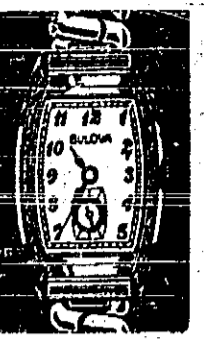

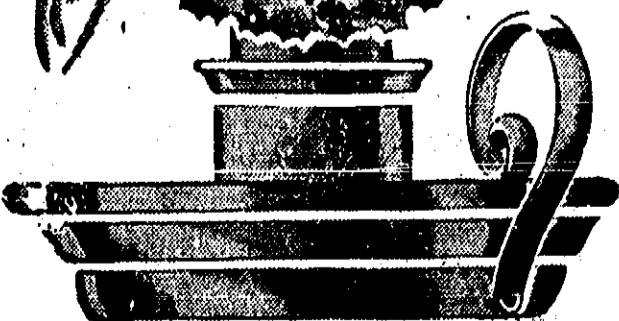
